The event aimed to promote living an active lifestyle

while raising awareness of heart disease, and the signs and symptoms of a heart attack that often go undetected in women. According to the American Heart Association Go Red for Women reports 80% of cardiac and stroke events may be prevented with education and action.

The event was open to community. During the event, the chapter provided information on heart disease and tips to lead a heart healthy lifestyle. The chapter also collected \$155 in donations for the American Heart Association. The Upsilon Sigma Omega chapter plans to continue heart health awareness activities throughout the month of February.


