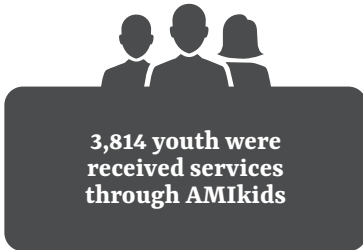


AMIKids, Inc. is a national organization that uses its evidence-based AMIKids Personal Growth Model™ to provide educational and behavioral health services to youth who have been involved with, or are at risk of entering, the justice system. **In calendar year 2022, AMIKids served youth across 227 counties in nine states at 54 unique programs.**

CHALLENGES EXPERIENCED BY OUR YOUTH

Upon enrollment in an AMIKids program, we assess all youth to identify the specific needs and strengths of each child and their family. This information is critical for AMIKids to provide individualized care for each youth to meet their particular goals and plans. Despite the challenges below, 91% of youth show motivation for treatment and are open to receive services.

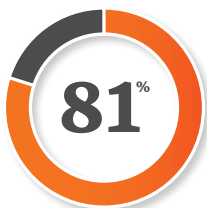

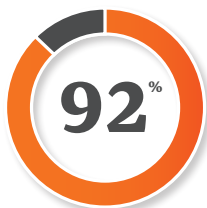

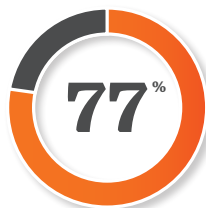

IN 2022, YOUTH WHO PARTICIPATED IN AMIKIDS PROGRAMMING ACHIEVED PERSONAL GROWTH:

- Youth significantly increased their level of school engagement, emotion regulation skills and relationship-building skills from enrollment to their most recent assessment
- 97% used at least one positive coping skill during a recent challenge
- 95% feel confident in being able to finish high school or earn their GED
- 92% have clear education or career plans their first year after high school
- 92% maintained or increased their protective factors and 36% significantly decreased their risk factors
- Youth earned 1,267 middle school, 1,868 high school and 15 college credits
- 73 youth earned their High School Diploma or GED
